To punctuate and describe speech.

- 3) He asked his broad aunt, the Hippopotamus, why her eyes were red, and his broad aunt, the Hippopotamus, spanked him with her broad, broad hoof:
- 4) He asked his hairy uncle, the Baboon, why melons tasted just so, and his hairy uncle, the Baboon, spanked him with his hairy, hairy paw.

Task 2

He asked questions about everything that he saw, or heard, or felt, or smelt, or touched, and all his uncles and his aunts spanked him. And still he was full of 'satiable curiosity!

This is how the story continues. Your next task is to re-write this section of the story using direct speech. Think about which animals the elephant spoke to and what questions he asked them.
