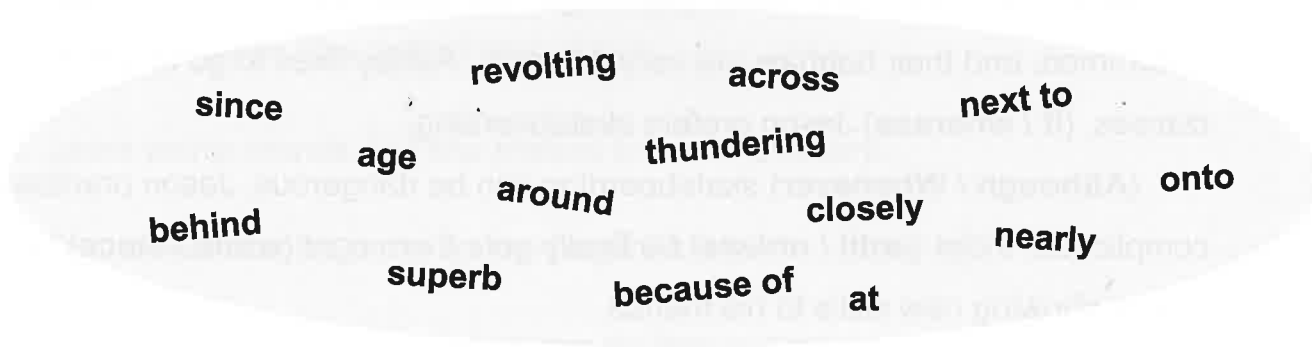


Prepositions

I have a haircut (**at** / **on**) eleven o'clock.

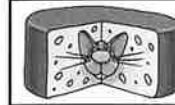
I try to drink water (**within** / **throughout**) the day.
