Apostrophes for Single Possession




To show that someone or something owns something, add an apostrophe and 's'. For singular nouns, you always add the 's', even if the word ends in 's' already.

apostrophe + 's' the cook's pot the walrus's tusks

You can use apostrophes to show possession for plural nouns.
