Every year The Sunday Times publishes an edition of their schools guide 'Parent Power'. We are delighted to announce that South Farnham School has retained its place as the top state primary school in Surrey.

Schools are ranked by the aggregated average scaled scores achieved by children in reading, grammar and maths end of Key Stage 2 SATs. South Farnham ranked 11th in the country which is a fantastic achievement, especially when you look at the number of children sitting the tests - 136 at our school. 11th out of the 15,000 primary schools in the country places South Farnham in the top 0.07% of school nationally. We were also delighted to achieve the same ranking as the 3rd highest performing independent school!

This is not the first time South Farnham School has achieved these positions and it is testament to the hard work and excellence of our pupils, staff and Governors. Not only are all the children achieving well academically, they are also having a fantastically rich curriculum including performing arts, sport, visual arts and music whilst maintaining our continual pursuit of excellence in all areas of school life.

Assemblies have been a little bit different this year but we have been delighted to continue to perform and create our much loved class assemblies. We have shared these 'live' within our immediate bubble and with the rest of the school and our families via the wonderful magic of 'video links'.
